REFLECTIONS FROM THE RECTORY

Usually this month we are positive and hopeful as we either reflect on the story of Easter just celebrated or as this year, about to be celebrated. The story of grace and hope offered by the love of God in Jesus Christ is the power of life for all of us. Sometimes I think this is a little like the final walkdown of a traditional pantomime where all the story is behind us and we can enjoy all the glitter that foreshadows the happy ending. The happy ending may of course be there but at what cost and for whom.

The two weeks before Easter Sunday are known as Passiontide, the season of the passion. Passion for most of us means a very strong emotion and surely it is also true that here in the Easter story we are confronted by the strongest of emotions as Jesus completes his earthly purpose. For most Christians of course it raises quite strong emotions as well. It might be that you are a humanist or perhaps see yourself as a realist and so all religion is essentially a story to misdirect and mislead people from the supremacy of our own intellect or the effective grappling with the experiences we have day by day. If you are a believer though, then as a Christian, crucifixion and resurrection are at the heart of God's eternal purpose. In Jesus we know what God is like because being very God himself, his life in word and action reveal to us (for better or worse) the nature of the Creator and Sustainer of the material world.

Perhaps it is no surprise then that betrayal and pain should lie at the heart of the Easter story. Most of us if betrayed would like a little revenge at least. If we look back at our lives most of us can find some story that will resonate, a pain that we hold on to however minor the moment in our lives.

Did a friend betray you by going out with your boyfriend/girlfriend and breaking your heart?

Did anyone at work ever manipulate to ensure they received preferment rather than you? Betrayal is about injustice so where do you experience that in your life?

When the chips are down most of us are more than capable of putting our own preference before the good of others and using our power and influence to benefit ourselves so perhaps you can remember an occasion when you betrayed the trust or hope of another. If not, then how many stories have you read or seen where betrayal is a central motif?

Passiontide is about betrayal, the betrayal of Adam and Eve in rejecting God's love and guidance to run their own race. The betrayal of the people of Israel when time and again they pay lip service to the truth whilst going their own way. The intimate personal betrayal of Judas in selling Jesus for a false dream of revolution, insurrection and independence and Peter's personally humiliating and humbling failure to own his relationship with Jesus. Passiontide is about the pain and loss of everything you hoped for, the failure of dreams and ultimately a mother's deep grief as she watches her innocent son crucified, dying before her.

If this is just another human tragedy, another story of injustice and betrayal and the abuse of power then we might hope that knowing what is right and wrong we might at least improve on the mistakes of the past, though there is little evidence from history that we are capable of doing that. Where does this knowledge of right and wrong come from? I believe it is part of God's gift to us. It is part of the character of God to know what is right, to know how to make the right choice in any situation. If we are to have choice then it must be meaningful and not subverted by God manipulating it back to the right answer. If there was nothing beyond the present then this might be cruel for there is no greater aim or purpose to justify the pain but if this is part of the divine story of love then it ceases to be cruel and becomes transformative power for good.

As Christians this is what we know to be true, the transformative power of love is made manifest in Jesus and by his gift the brokenness of our poor choices is redeemed. Easter is all about hope and new life. Where is your hope and where is your life and fruitfulness today? St Peter in surprise exclaims to Jesus on one occasion 'Lord it is good for us to be here, if you wish, I will make tents/dwellings' a place to be together. Ultimately that place is not here but where God is and at Easter Jesus pays the price of our visa to enter it but we have to ask for it and we have to carry it. My passport does not make me British, it just witnesses to the fact. In the same way, making a declaration of belief is an important witness that speaks to a truth each of us must live out in our lives for it to be authentic as we seek to allow God to be reflected in us.

This Easter may you know the transforming love of God in your life and heart.



COATES PARISH COUNCIL

The parish council met on Monday 6 March and the following items were discussed:

- Three quotes on replacement matting for the village playground have been received. It was decided to wait until after the next ROSPA survey has been carried out before deciding which tender to accept.
- The Coates Parish Emergency Plan questionnaire has been distributed to residents.
- A letter from Earl Bathurst concerning new arrangements for traffic diversions during the Cotswold Show has been received.
- A member of the public reported witnessing and hearing of dangerous driving and speeding on Trewsbury Road and asked councillors what may be done to reduce the dangers for horseriders, cyclists and pedestrians. It was confirmed that evidence of speeding needs to be logged (either by council representatives or members of the public) on the GCC website for road traffic accidents. Councillors and other village residents are undergoing speed camera training in order to assist with evidence gathering. It may also be possible to erect signs to remind drivers to slow down as they enter the village.
- Litter problems have also been reported; it was agreed to arrange a village litter pick in the spring.
- The meeting was informed of the proposed village event (Coates Village Grande Fiesta) which is scheduled to take place at Trewsbury Farm on 17 June 2017.
- Accounts / Spending for January February 2017 were noted and approved.
- The meeting was informed that an interview for the clerk's
 position had taken place and a candidate has been offered and
 accepted the position. The new clerk will commence work for
 Coates parish council at the beginning of May.
- Councillors were invited to consider John Dobson's application to fill the vacant position of councillor (co-opted) on the parish council. His co-option was agreed by all present.
- The village clock has now been restored and will be returned to the village on Friday 10 March.

The Annual Parish Meeting will take place at 7.30pm on 24 April 2017; the next meeting of the parish council will take place on Tuesday 2 May 2017 at 7.30pm in the village hall. Please do come to these meetings.

NOTES FROM CULKERTON

GARDENING TIPS FOR APRIL

Here we are at last in Spring! The parade of beautiful and colourful of early flowering bulbs continues, complimented with blossom. With a little thought, this delightful combination of prettiness, high and low, can continue for four months, starting in February and becoming more abundant through to May with fragrance too!

The scented narcissus has come into season; these beauties bloom later season and go through May as well. The smaller flowered varieties such as Pheasant's Eye, Cheerfulness, Bridal Crown are favourites. I have also started growing the larger flowered double types in white and peach shades, Delnashaugh, Acropolis and Replete.

April is also a very busy time in the garden; frenetic time spent now cultivating, weeding sowing, and planting will be rewarded for the rest of the growing season. So we can all look forward to many occasions sitting down with a relaxing pot of tea and afternoon cake enjoying the aesthetics of your piece of the universe on sunny days, pure enjoyment.

As the soil becomes very workable and a fine tilth raked through, direct sow beetroot, chard, lettuce, turnips and early carrots. In dry weather water the drill first and then sow your seeds finely. As the odd frost or several very cold nights are still a reality, I find French and Runner beans are better planted in individual small pots to plant out in late May as larger plants, their roots will suffer less disturbance and if well hardened off be less susceptible to being eaten by slugs and snails. Ash from the winter fires spread around the young plants like chorister's collar will also deter these pesky molluscs; the added potash is a good plant food for fruit.

Another group of vegetables are courgettes, patty pan, pumpkin, squashes, cucumbers and melons to sow under cover or indoors, to plant out when all possibility of frost has passed in late May. These are better sown in late April to avoid leggy seedlings. Check all your seedlings during warm weather and make sure they have constant moist growing conditions to prevent the compost from drying out and stunting growth.

Hardy annual flower seeds can either be direct sown or into seed trays. The latter is useful if the space in the garden is not yet available (full of spring bulbs) or yet to be prepared; germinating in trays will

allow several more weeks of time.

My garden pond is looking very healthy now with plenty of lush marginal and aquatic plants including duckweed thus blocking light to and preventing masses of blanket algae, so it has taken two growing seasons to overcome the 'New Pond' syndrome. Although the newts seem to be present, our population of frogs and toads has crashed, which is rather a concern.

Will there be apricots for picking this year? My tree has overcome a leaf disease resulting in severe dieback; after carefully removing all fallen leaves each autumn and summer pruning out the dead and dying wood, I now have a large and shapely tree with masses of fruit buds and blossom. Last year the blossom had a good set but a late frost destroyed all the little fruits...so fingers crossed for this year! Sally Oates

THE GOLDEN VOICE

I shouldn't begin by claiming that my cock blackbird is better than yours, but he probably is, so I will. Actually, there are two of them: Percy Bysshe, who rules the top garden and sings primarily from the old Bramley apple tree, and Samuel Taylor whose citadel is the lilac clump in the lower garden. They are named after the Romantic poets Percy Bysshe Shelley and Samuel Taylor Coleridge. Both have attracted mates, who single-handedly built nests while their husbands were too busy singing and, after some initial male stimulation, are doing all the practical work – at least, until the eggs hatch and the endless chore of feeding four of five ravenous youngsters begins.

Technically, all cock blackbirds are equal; it's just that some are more equal than others, in that they sing with greater resonance and meaning. These alpha choristers may well be older birds who are less experiential than first year songsters, and have successfully finetuned their art. Percy Bysshe was, I strongly suspect, with us last spring, and is a master of matins and choral evensong. The song sounds familiar and he uses the same perch. He may well be three years old, a fair age for a blackbird. Samuel Taylor, on the other hand, shows all the characteristics of being a first year bird, offering some twiddly bits which are over-elaborate and simply over the top. He may even be Percy Bysshe's son, though they clearly hate each other's

guts and squabble endlessly. The only thing that has united them is their deep loathing of winter immigrant blackbirds, those dark-billed invaders from Scandinavia which left us when spring started to push in in early March.

All through the winter there were daily tussles between resident and immigrant blackbirds, with the incomers being chased around endlessly. They were only after food, not territory. Then, the birds that remained battled to establish territories. This involved much jumping up in the air together, sparring, and an awful lot of irritating pink! pink! pinking! at dusk.

Eventually spring settles them down, and they do what they do best, most notably at dawn and dusk but, when spring takes them, all through the day.

Enjoy your blackbirds. Theirs is a powerful medicine and a heady message.

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
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CIRENCESTER EATING DISORDER SUPPORT GROUP
