



28 March 'Cirencester History and Heritage' - Steve Fearn


Steve Fearn of the Cirencester Civic Society will take us on a virtual tour, exploring Cirencester's past through its buildings.

NEWS FROM SAPPERTON AND FRAMPTON MANSELL

A PERSONAL POINT OF VIEW

According to Benjamin Franklin, we humans can only be certain of two things; death and taxes. Whilst not everyone will agree with Franklin, it is true that most of our life is filled with uncertainties. Where there is uncertainty, errors are inevitable in judgements that are based on the balance of probabilities or incomplete knowledge. Consequently, we are all prone to making mistakes and we require the honest maturity to accept those errors.

Simple errors of judgement due to inadequate judgement are unintentional. Negligence is usually a consequence of arrogant pride. There are also deliberate errors through concealment or deception, which are more accurately termed lies. All too frequently, when errors of judgment are not acknowledged by the perpetrator, the consequences can readily roll into negligence.

In his book 'Objective Knowledge', philosopher Sir Karl Popper wisely said, "Nobody is exempt from making mistakes; the great thing is to learn from them." To learn from our mistakes, we need to recognise them, accept them, and acknowledge them as our own. Only then is it meaningful to apologise and, where possible, make amends for our errors. Sadly, where a person's pride dominates, there is hindrance to humility and, for those in authority, acts of humility are often repressed by stylistic hubris. Many politicians seem more concerned with projecting a stylised image of themselves as being infallible rather than admitting to making mistakes. Those who do admit their mistakes have stature as, for example, the Labour 'giant' Dennis Healey, who said, "There's nothing wrong with a U-turn if it goes in the direction of the British people."

In war, the act of revenge by political leaders is what I would call a deliberate mistake where the killing of thousands of innocent people is dismissed as inevitable 'collateral damage'. Recognising the inevitability of errors and public wrongs, William Blackstone, the 18th century English jurist, wrote in his famous 'Commentaries on the laws of England' that, "It is better that ten guilty persons escape, than that one innocent party suffer."

Since the 1997 Law Commission's review of the law on hearsay evidence in the 1984 Police and Criminal Evidence Act, the gross errors of the Post Office 'Horizon' scandal have centred on a false common law assumption that computer systems are always correct, even though there is a high likelihood of errors (bugs) in most

software programmes. It is incomprehensible that the lack of honesty and insight has taken more than 20 years to be acknowledged when the consequences to thousands of people have been devastating. The Bible tells us that, "If anyone sins because they do not speak up when they hear a public charge to testify regarding something they have seen or learned about, they will be held responsible." [Leviticus 5:1]

Consider Pontious Pilate who, despite no evidence against Jesus of the crimes for which he was accused, made a deliberate wrong choice to exonerate his own responsibilities by taking the stylistic face-saving option of washing his hands in front of a riotous crowd saying, "I am innocent of this man's blood; see to it yourselves." [Matthew 27:24] What's more, although Pilate had the power, he then did nothing to stop the illegal crucifixion.

Errors and mistakes are present in all aspects of society and our responsibility is to act accordingly. We would all benefit from adopting the maxim of the 19th century Scottish architect, Charles Rennie Macintosh, "There is hope in honest error, none in the icy perfections of the mere stylist."

NOTES FROM CULKERTON

GARDENING TIPS FOR MARCH

The joy of autumn planted bulbs emerging from the soil and coming into bloom is so deeply pleasant and satisfying, especially sharing this with the next generation of your family. Planting the bulbs and watching their development.

In the same way gardeners are planting and nurturing for the future, be it for a quick crop or perennial returns, like visiting old friends for many years.

We plant for seasons to come; currently different kales are to be harvested and the autumn broad beans are growing slowly but surely, which is a reminder to sow another succession.

To get ahead with sowing other hardy vegetable and summer flowers, either start with protection inside a greenhouse or cold frame, also warm soil outside prior to sowing with a low tunnel of polythene. Prevailing weather and temperatures are the prime consideration. Hardy vegetables to sow in modules with the intention of planting out in several weeks' time: beetroot, spring onions, lettuce, peas, spinach, coriander, parsley, early cabbage and broccoli.

There is still time to chit potatoes in light cool place, the aim is to produce new shoots no more than a centimetre long that are glistening with energy. Plant when ready but avoid frosty weather (a rarity over winter, but who knows if nature will throw a curved ball) and give ample spacing for growing and harvesting.

Hardy annual flowers to sow now in modules: echium, achillea, cornflower, scabious, calendula, bergamot, Californian poppies, lavatera, and a last sowing of sweet peas.

Recently seed sowing kits have become more widely available which include an element for self–watering; in fact, any self-watering systems are worth considering for plants/seedlings restricted by pots. Large gravel trays have been my choice for many years. Soil in greenhouse borders seems to become impoverished annually, I suspect this is due to intense heat that destroys soil micro-organisms. Give greenhouse borders plenty of organic matter rich compost especially in late summer for autumn planting of overwintering salad crops.

This month is the final time to clear architectural dead stems from the garden, with warmer, longer days overwintering hibernating ladybirds and other beneficial insects should be on the move and seeking out aphids. A good sign of genuine warmth and change of season is the appearance of frog spawn and successful young tadpoles. Keep

weeding and preparing ground for sowing seeds directly later this month as the weather allows.

Look after your own hands and feet with suitable clothing. There are many types of gloves, some snug fitting and waterproof which are best for hand weeding, tough thick thorn proof gloves for pruning; seek out the most appropriate for your gardening tasks and treat hands to restorative hand creams afterwards. As I garden most days, garden clogs with thick memory inner soles are a must for me, very comfortable and more insulating in cold weather.

Soon the early tulips will join the narcissus for the spring blossom show, plenty to look forward too for 2024.

We will remember precious little about the winter now passing: mud, flood and puddle mostly – and potholes and road closures. There were a few grains of snow one early January dusk, the sort that looks like washing powder drifting aimlessly about in the gloaming. The following morning, January 9th, I might just have scraped a tiny snowball off a greenhouse roof, though the garden itself was barren. That was it. This is what rip-off Britain looks like, I can't even remember where my toboggan is. A canoe would be more apt nowadays.

Of course, there could yet be a sting in the tail of the 'winter' of 2023-24, as happened back in 2018 when The Beast from the East struck as February was ending and the rooks were incubating their eggs. Then, snowdrifts closed the main road between Swindon and Marlborough for several days. But all the signs are that this winter will give up sooner rather than later and surrender prematurely into yet another early spring. Already, the fields are greening up strongly. Time was when they looked that verdant in late March. Time was when the early-flowering Mirabelle blackthorn blossom appeared at Easter, this year it was well out during the February half-term.

Easter falls early this year, and early Easters have a track record of being blighted by poor weather. Fingers crossed for our young families, who desperately need warm Easter sunshine after yet another abominably wet, sunless and storm-struck winter, when the kids were stuck indoors far too much – and the grownups, and the

dogs. As it is, venturing away during bank holidays is becoming increasingly risky, with ports, airports and the M5 blocking up horrifically, and the railway system closing down for repairs. Roaming local has its attractions, not least because The Cotswolds contain so many hidden gems, and because cloudlessness can transform even the most familiar place.

We need drying out. Bring on a spring even lovelier than the one mired by lockdown restrictions, and worse, back in 2020, when Nature nurtured many of us through a most difficult time. Bring on sunburn! We need to be careful, though, not to take too much for granted, and to embrace each magical moment that spring offers – and not to waste Easter's most glorious day on a shopping trip to Cribbs Causeway.
