

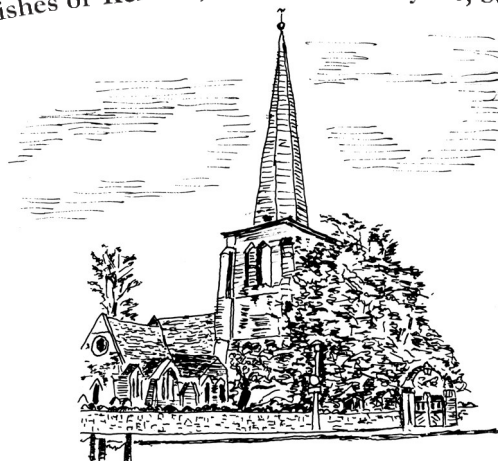

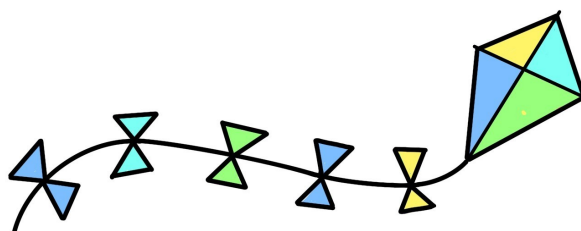

We are now in full summer and in Thameshead our gardens, meadows and hedgerows are blooming and buzzing with life.

The sensory garden in Kemble Community Gardens has a range of flowering and scented plants that are now well-established. Relax on the bench (bring a cup of tea) and enjoy the sight, sound and smells of your surroundings.



The first Saturday in July is National Meadows Day, so a great time to appreciate wildflowers and grasses, and the insects that visit them. Later in the month, you can take part in some citizen science by signing up for the Big Butterfly Count to help monitor the health of our butterfly population – sadly last year numbers were down, so hopefully the warmer, drier spring will have helped them to recover.

You may have a bird bath, but bees also get thirsty in hot weather so your garden needs a bee bath too! Fill a simple dish with water and add some pebbles to create different levels that will help visitors drink safely without falling in. Place it in a partly shady spot and keep it topped up with clean water.

Here are some other ways we can join in:

Plastic Free July – a campaign to encourage us to be part of the solution to plastic pollution.

5 July – **National Meadows Day** - celebrating the beauty and importance of meadows.

12 July and 9 August - **Litter picking** – meet at the Tavern at 10.30 – all welcome. Cirencester **Repair Café** will also be open from 10.00 – 13.00 at the Baptist Church.

18 July – 10 August **Big Butterfly Count** - You can download an identification guide and submit your findings at bigbutterflycount.butterfly-conservation.org.

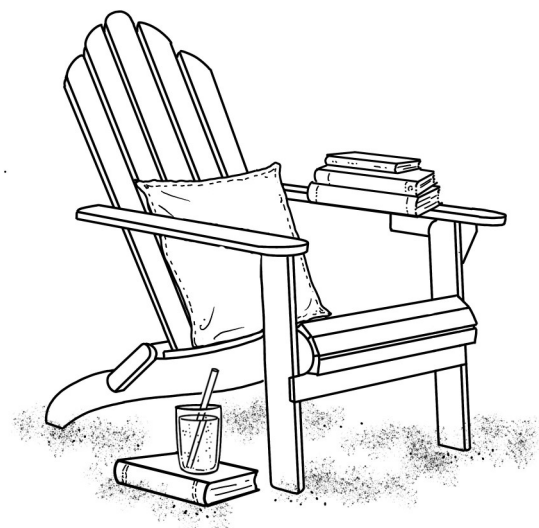
25 July to 3 August: **Love Parks Week** – a week long celebration of our parks across the UK.

Rev Pepita Walker

Rev Pepita Walker was admitted to the Company of St Kyneburga by the Bishop of Tewkesbury at a service of Evensong in Gloucester Cathedral on 17th June.

This is what the Order of Service for Evensong included about Pepita:

On moving to the Cotswolds, Pepita soon became involved in church and community life. After many years on the PCC, running youth and church groups, supporting the repairs and re-opening of St Luke's, Frampton Mansell and the Village Hall, as well as being a Foundation Governor of Sapperton C of E School, Pepita took the difficult decision to get ordained and, with the support of her husband Paul, worked as a non-stipendiary priest in the Thameshead Benefice. Having taken the benefice through vacancy 12 years ago, then continuing to work tirelessly in the parish and benefice, she retired. Six months later, she returned to parish and benefice ministry, now holding Permission to Officiate. She is now being called upon increasingly as the benefice is once again in vacancy. Pepita supported the community through Covid, remains the school Chaplain and Governor, takes regular services, Occasional Offices, and provides guidance and support to lay leaders and the PCC. All this done with wisdom, common sense, good humour, kindness, creativity and a love for God. Her role in supporting the community as well as the church has been constant.

The old testament lesson at the service was taken from the 51st chapter of the book Ecclesiasticus, read by the Chaplain to the Company of St Kyneburga, and opens with words very apt to Pepita:

*While I was still young, before I went on my travels, I sought wisdom openly in my prayer.
Before the temple I asked for her, and I will search for her until the end.
From the first blossom to the ripening grape, my heart delighted in her;
My foot walked on the straight path; from my youth I followed her steps.
I inclined my ear a little and received her; and I found for myself much instruction.*

St Kyneburga

St Kyneburga was the co-foundress and abbess in the 8th Century of the first religious community at what is now Gloucester Cathedral. Membership of the Company of St Kyneburga recognises and honours people who have built up, maintained and enriched the life of the church in Gloucestershire over many years. 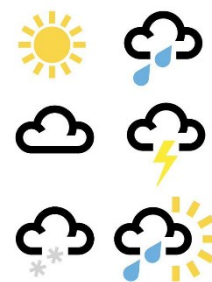

Farming Matters

We live in strange and uncertain times. Wars in Ukraine and the Middle East which higher powers seem unable to bring to an end, recent changes in global trade arrangements still causing confusion in agricultural markets and a lack of direction from our own government on farming, food and environmental policies. Even the recent Spending Review announced by the Chancellor gave little clarity.

But the more immediate concern for many farmers is the uncertainty in our weather patterns. According to the Met Office, spring 2025 was the warmest spring since records began in 1884, with a mean temperature of 9.5°C, 1.4°C above the long-term average. It was the sunniest spring on record for the UK overall, it was also a very dry spring, ranking as the sixth driest since 1836, with only 128.2mm of rainfall, about 40% below the long-term average.



I know we all like a bit of warm, dry, sunny weather, especially coming out of winter, but this year has been exceptional, adding to the uncertainty farmers face. When will it rain? How much will we get? Is it worth planting that crop? Will the grass grow enough for my winter feed requirements? Will it ever stop raining? Farmers have battled for centuries with these uncertainties, but the seasons have always seemed to balance out.

Now we seem to roll from one extreme to the next. Grass growth this spring peaked in the first week of May at 75 kg of dry matter/ha (average across the country), marginally above the 7-year average growth rate. By the end of May it had plummeted to 46 kg/ha, just two thirds of the 7-year average. We did get a little rain in early June allowing growth rates to return to a more normal 66 kg/ha by early June. But now we're looking at another prolonged dry spell. This fluctuation makes planning grazing and cutting grass for winter feed is quite challenging. Despite the shortage of grass for grazing, milk production has increased this spring, and farm gate milk prices have remained high. So, what's behind this odd combination of events.

There has been a noticeable trend among dairy farmers to move towards a block calving system and away from a more traditional all year-round system. Calving the herd in a block (typically autumn or spring) makes managing the herd, and the growing offspring easier, and can lower costs of production. The share of GB farms in 2024 running a block calving system has risen to 20%, giving us higher spring production. Seasonal milk is more difficult for milk processors to manage because consumer demand is fairly level as over 50% of milk produced is sold as fresh milk.



This year, spring production was the highest on record, reaching a peak of 39 million litres per day early in May. (The trough occurs in August with daily production around 32 million litres) So how was this extra milk produced with farmers complaining about lack of rainfall and low grass growth. It's all down to supply and demand. There has been strong demand for dairy products this spring led by butter and cream (up 20%), and to a lesser extent cheese (up 12%). This has kept farm gate prices high, up 15% on last year at around 45pence per litre.

While overall consumption is down, there are some areas of growth for dairy. Changes in consumer preferences are driving growth from certain categories, increased demand for higher protein content, rising interest in gut health, growing scepticism towards ultra-processed foods and a surge in demand for naturalness. Many of these trends are circulating on social media and, as a result, products such as cottage cheese, whole milk and kefir yogurt have seen noticeable growth.

Despite uncertainty of grass growth, when returns for milk sales are high it makes good economic sense to feed cows extra rations to keep milk output up. This extra feed is often forages conserved from last year's crops and/or concentrated feed bought in to the farm to supplement home grown foods. Either way it appears you can turn the tap on when circumstances are favourable.

Some areas however are in decline. The number of organic dairy cows in the UK has been decreasing since 2019, with a 7% decline from 2023 to 2024. The latest data for 2024 shows that only 1.5% of dairy cows in the UK were in an organic system, now amounting to 48,000 head. Total dairy cow numbers saw a less steep decline in 2024 compared to the previous year. The total number of dairy cows in the UK stands at 3,209,000 head, 0.6% less than the previous year. More milk from less cows shows huge gains in efficiency and a reduced carbon footprint for one of our staple foods.

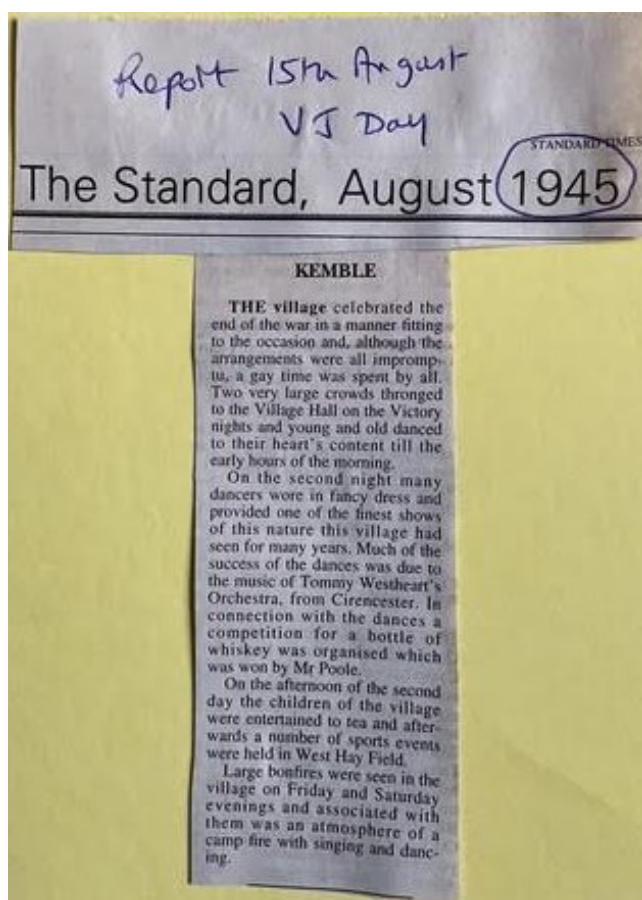
