

### **Reader Ramblings**

#### Dear friends

Well, I've been a Reader for a whole six months – and am still suffering from a severe case of imposter syndrome. However, as the right person to lead us going forward is still be discerned, I'm having plenty of practice and loving the warm and gracious way in which you have all welcomed me into this new role.

In our Diocese we still have Readers, though elsewhere we are starting to be called Licensed Lay Ministers. I rather like the old title, though I do understand that it can feel slightly obscure. I've been asked several times what I can now do that I couldn't before. It's a difficult question to answer because, like many, I was already doing a lot of the things that used to be the province of Readers such as leading services which I had done as a warden and as a lay worship leader, and preaching a sermon which isn't so very different from giving a talk which I had done several times. The main difference is not what I can do but who I am. This feels as though I am fulfilling my vocation, much like many of you who find yourselves doing what you believe you were born for, be that a particular career, or raising children, or simply being you.

Let's have a look at the gospel according to Matthew:

"And Jesus came and said to them, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

[Matthew 28:18-20]

This passage, known as the Great Commission, tells us we are all to be disciples. We each do that in our own way, but if you feel your way may be to play a bigger part in church life, do have a conversation with someone about that and explore what your calling might be.

For most of May we remain in the glorious season of Easter, which in my view continues to involve a lot of chocolate, and we hold the joy of Christ's resurrection in our hearts. Forty days after the resurrection, Jesus ascended into heaven, marked on Ascension Day, 29 May. Between then and Pentecost, on 8 June, Christian churches across the UK join in a wave of prayer known as Thy Kingdom Come (TKC). In our Benefice the plan is to have a prayer walk in each of our six parishes and a service in each of our nine places of worship – see the draft schedule below in the magazine. Most services will be a short compline at 9pm, but at Sapperton we have a Benefice communion service on 1 June at which Bishop Robert will preside. Do join in for any part of TKC as you are able: it would be good to see a full church for Bishop Robert.



### KEPC POLICE AND CRIME UPDATE (also dial 101 or 111...???)

The PC have noticed that there has been a slight but not insignificant increase in local crime recently within the Parish community.

Although serious crime ( stolen vehicle crime or so called County Lines crime carried out by organised gangs ) is more of a National Issue we still have our part to play in this and well as more so called 'local crimes' such as vandalism, fly tipping and burglary.

This local crime is always possible within any village environment and is both seasonal and fairly random within the Parish, however with the aid of the local community, as well as the Police, the scale of such activity can be reduced.

Prevention and awareness are the key points here as well as all Parishioners maintaining a keen eye on unusual activity and events. The parking of the (rather ubiquitous) unmarked white van, for example is always worthy of suspicion and of note; an innocent enquiry regarding the occupants business in the Parish would not go amiss and may just deter the opportunist thief. A quick 101 call in this instant again would not be deemed inappropriate..more on that number later..

As the Summer Season approaches we tend to spend much more time outside and hopefully enjoy more fresh air by opening our windows and doors, both of these activities lending themselves to theft and possible burglary, the message here being make sure all your valuables are secured and when you are not at home all windows and doors are locked.

Mobile phone theft is also on the rise, these everyday essentials (!) are now being termed 'hi value items' by most police forces and therefore an easy target for criminals...many phones being stolen whilst being used by the owners whilst walking down the street!!.....also an easy lift from the owners back pocket, so please stow them away securely.

Finally that note on non emergency phone numbers.....remember

101 - NON EMERGENCY POLICE .....reporting crime already happened, sharing information, suspect activity, fly tipping etc

111- NON EMERGENCY NHS .....in need of medical help but not an emergency, general advice etc.

No need to remind - If Life is in danger or a crime is in progress it's 999.

Note - check out WHAT THREE WORD APP- for your precise location information...if you have this simple app installed on your phone you can let the emergency services know your exact location by.....guess what, THREE WORDS....easy to set up and recognised by all the emergency services!!

### **Farming Matters**

At last, the Blackthorn is in flower. Later than usual, probably due to the cold dreary weather we had in Feb/Mar. More recent fine, dry weather continued into early April allowing farmers to get up to date with spring planting, an increased area than was planned, due to the poor weather conditions limiting planting opportunities last autumn. But we need balance. Farmers are now desperate for rain to encourage crop growth. Not too much please, as later spring crops like maize and potatoes need favourable planting conditions later in April.

Those of you that suffer from hay fever, or have a pollen allergy, will know we have entered the hay fever season. The release of pollen follows flowering, although some flowers are not that obvious. The season starts with trees, Hazel, Yew and Alder are the early culprits while Birch, Ash and Oak are in full flow by early May. The Horse Chestnut tree is one of our showier trees and will also be dropping pollen around early May.

It's been pleasing to see recent woodland maintenance carried out locally. This is a vital part of tree management which often goes unnoticed or neglected as the economics are, at best, questionable. The timber arisings from the recent work will be sold for biomass and woodchip, helping to offset the cost of the work. Woodland Condition is a term that is increasingly used in the forestry sector to describe the ecological condition of a woodland and reflects the biodiversity status, tree health and the provision of environmental benefits.

Woodland in good ecological condition provides a whole range of benefits, including improvements in air quality, purification of ground water, carbon storage, wildlife habitats, not to mention timber and fuel supply. Good condition can be impacted by a range of pressures such as invasive species, emerging tree pests and diseases, browsing animals like deer and grey squirrels and poor maintenance. Little or no woodland management can lead to dense, shady environments with a uniform structure and a poor understory, resulting in low biodiversity unable to support a varied ecosystem. It's therefore important that good woodland maintenance is carried out to keep these valuable areas productive and healthy.

Many of the areas which have seen recent work would have benefitting from the Forestry Commission Woodland Grant Scheme in the 1980s. The economics of lowland timber production are poor, so these incentives were provided to en-



courage planting. The Scheme provided payments over 40 years to encourage farmers to plant trees to provide these benefits but with a requirement that maintenance be carried out over that period. As a result, copses were created at this time with many examples around the area (either side of the Thames between the A429 and Parker's Bridge for example). Previously, extensive planting took place in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century, again with many examples locally. Fangrove (1899), Severalls (1906) Marjorie (1920). This period was one of relative prosperity in the farming world following a depressed time in the

late 19<sup>th</sup> century, illustrating the need for a prosperous farming sector, and/or financial incentives, to deliver these benefits.

The UK only grows about 20% of the timber it consumes, leaving the remaining 80% to be imported. On 21 March 2025, the Government announced a new National Forest covering Wiltshire, Glos. and West of England. The forest partnership will work with landowners, businesses and local communities to plant 2500 hectares of new woodland and other tree habitats in its first five years, with an aspiration to plant 20 million trees by 2050.

You may have noticed other works going on around Kemble recently. The underground ducts are being installed to take the cables from the new solar farm. This involved digging across the railway tunnel, generating understandable interest from Network Rail. They were interested to hear that when the 'Cheltenham and Great Western Union Railway' was established in 1836, Robert Gordon, who owned the Kemble Estate at the time, insisted that the line passing Kemble House should be in a tunnel, as he didn't want dirty steam trains spoiling his view. This was evident in the trenches recently dug as either side of the tunnel was undisturbed, layered limestone, while over the tunnel was backfilled rubble. I'm not sure HS2 would afford the same considerations.

And remember, Oak before Ash, we're in for a splash, Ash before Oak, we're in for a soak.
