WINTER TRADITIONS

We all have traditions. Some are part of our regular life, such as our morning routine or having fish & chips on a Friday. Others come around at particular times of the year, such as Christmas and New Year. We often inherit traditions from other people and add to them as we go through life, so they become varied and unique to each person or family. When I was a teenager, it didn't feel like Christmas until we'd got all the decorations up, eaten our first homemade mince pies and started playing board games with my uncle while watching 'The Muppets' Christmas Carol' on the TV.

Another big part of Christmas tradition for many is music. Whether it's trying to avoid hearing Wham's Last Christmas (Whamageddon), grumbling about hearing the same songs on repeat in shops while secretly loving them, or singing Christmas Carols together, these are all a big part of the feel of the season. The traditional service of nine lessons and carols has an enduring appeal, whether shared with friends and family in our villages or watching the yearly broadcast from King's College Cambridge.

I still remember how empty it felt during my first Christmas as an ordained minister in 2020 when singing in church wasn't allowed due to Covid restrictions. That year I gained a new appreciation for the words of these songs that some of us sing every year. The images they conjure in our minds connect us to the enduring story of God sending Jesus to be born in that little town of Bethlehem as a sign of his love for us. When we sing about shepherds and angels, we encounter values of love, peace, joy, and care for one another that are still sorely needed in the Holy Land and throughout our world today.

Then, as December turns to January, we may find time to reflect on all that has happened in the past year. In this we may want to establish new traditions which bring life and health to ourselves and those around us. One of the enduring lessons from Covid times was the importance of community, friends and family. At a time when some can feel lonely and isolated, each of us can do our bit in looking out for those around us and putting the values of Christmas Carols into practise in very practical, down-to earth ways. These acts of care and kindness have a value beyond measure.

My hope and prayer is that in our community traditions this winter, each of us will feel welcomed and valued, that we will know that we are loved by God and those close to us, that we will start the New Year well and share the best of ourselves in whatever lies ahead. That would be a pretty good tradition to hold to and a good present to both give and receive this winter.

Get organised and book your Christmas tree collection before you've even cooked the turkey. 



NOTES FROM CULKERTON

GARDENING TIPS FOR DECEMBER AND JANUARY

For some years recreating deep, springy mossy lawns of my youth seemed only distant memory. These verdant luxuriant cushioned areas seemed impossible to establish with ever increasing warming and drier climate ...but not this summer and autumn. Moss is beautiful, and an essential ingredient nesting material for bumblebees, birds, and hedgehogs to name a few. As an ecological gardener it is very pleasing and the silver lining to a cool wet summer and warm, wild and wet autumn.

Also good for growing leafy green vegetables and climbing beans, it would also have been very suitable for sowing peas, if notice hadn't been paid to the likelihood of a hot August. This year's weather has also prolonged reblooming of roses, and for some in sheltered valleys a long season of harvesting runner beans into October!

Although long range weather forecasts are not reliable, a rough guide so far seems to be wet until the end of 2023 and then a cold, dry start for January and February 2024.

The wet weather has been interspersed with some warmer sunny days and whenever possible clearing and weeding plots ready for early spring sowings is underway. Annual weeds are composted, and nasty weeds like bindweed can compost in a hot bin composter.

Perennial ornamental borders are left until later in March for a tidy up, ladybirds often hibernate in hollow standing stems or bark.

So far there have only been light frosts and leaves are hanging on to the deciduous trees despite several named storms. As soon as leaves fall, and the trees and shrubs are dormant winter pruning can swing into action. Removing dead or damaged, crossing, and inward growing branches, completing the job with an overall shaping.

Tulip bulbs for planting this autumn include: 'Francoise', cream/pale yellow, 'Burgundy' lily shaped, 'Apricona' salmon with a touch of green, 'Elegant Lady', blends of creamy yellow and lavender, 'Royal Celebration' cream blended with purple, 'Chansonette', two tone white with purple, 'Orange Marmalade' obviously orange, with a green flame, and finally 'Colour Fusion' a rainbow mix of purples, dark reds, pinks, oranges, yellow and white. This selection will bloom in succession from April to May, large pots with plenty of gritty compost will be planted with two varieties (approximately 20 bulbs per pot).

NOTES FROM CULKERTON (cont)

Pots of Iris reticulata planted in previous years are expected to bloom from February onwards, there is plenty to look forward to in late winter and spring.

Anytime over winter is a great time to grow salad sprouting seeds and microgreens. These are very nutritious, easy, and quick to grow on a windowsill. Larger quantities of seeds are now readily available and compliment the more traditional mustard and cress.

Over the next two months, decide what and where you will sow during the coming year, and make a plan for quick reference.

WAXWINGS AHOY!

Autumn has successfully sogged and bogged itself into winter. By mid -November we had recorded 370mm of rain in our garden rain gauge, and the Thames Head sources either side of the A433 were heavily swollen. Hopefully, all that will subside into a dry(ish) winter, as we've collectively Had Enough... Oddly, the leaves remained green on many types of tree in the absence of frost – elms, hawthorns, sallows, and many garden shrubs (the ash trees cast away their leaves as per usual, they're driven by day-length and don't shift their habits).

Winter's flocks are gathering. There are some large flocks of wood pigeon around. At present, these are feasting on the abundant supply of beech mast (nuts), but that supply will probably be exhausted by Christmas. They could then become an agricultural pest, on oil seed rape fields.

Flocks of fieldfares and redwings have been scarce in our district to date (mid-November). They haven't needed to venture this far south, and west, given the mild weather and the abundant supply of berries – this is the best crop of hawthorn 'haws' I can recall. Their time will come, and they will strip that berry crop. Already I have seen them feasting on holly berries, suggesting that berried holly may be scarce by Christmas as the (abundant) berries are ripening early. Fortunately, there are some later-ripening holly varieties in gardens.

This promises to be a good waxwing winter, perhaps the best since that of 2012/13 when waxwing flocks could be viewed feeding on Sorbus (whitebeam) berries in Cirencester's Forum carpark, and even on some now-removed Sorbus trees at Tetbury Tesco. These are soft

-berry feeders that travel here from Scandinavia in varying numbers. Rowan berries are their favourite, and there is a goodly supply of them this winter. Waxwings tend to be oblivious to people and traffic, and sit around in trees close to an urban or suburban food source (berried trees), apparently suffering from indigestion. Silhouetted by winter's perpetual gloaming, they look like dumpy starlings, each with a Pterodactyl-like crest (in proper light, they're pinky-grey, with a strand of golden wing feathers).

If you want peace and reconciliation with Nature, then don't miss out on the three-figure linnet flock a little way along Emmerson Lane (to Cherington) from Chapman's Cross on the Stroud road. There's a winter birdfeed crop of sunflowers there, just past one of the (currently weedy and great for goldfinches) Sapperton Wilder fields. The linnets are feeding on the sunflower hearts and perching – and twittering joyously – on overhead wires. Experiences like that help guide us through winter.
