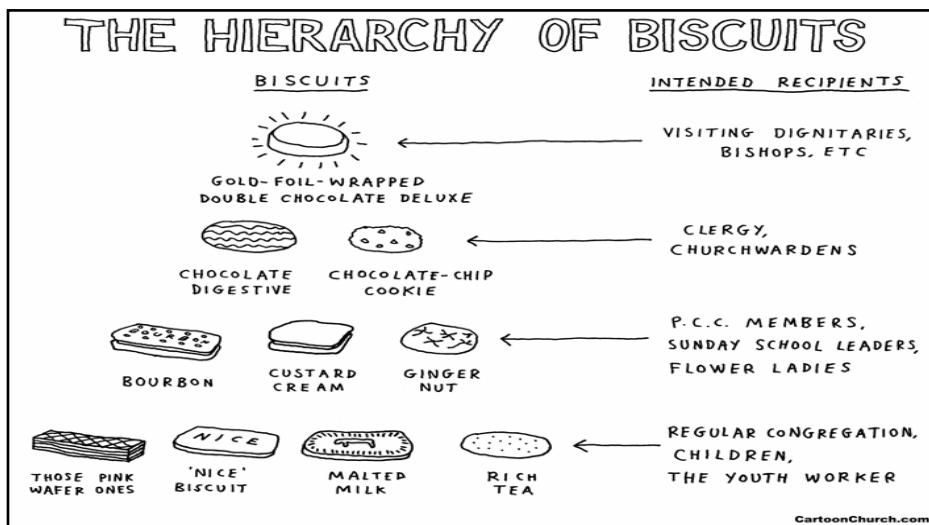

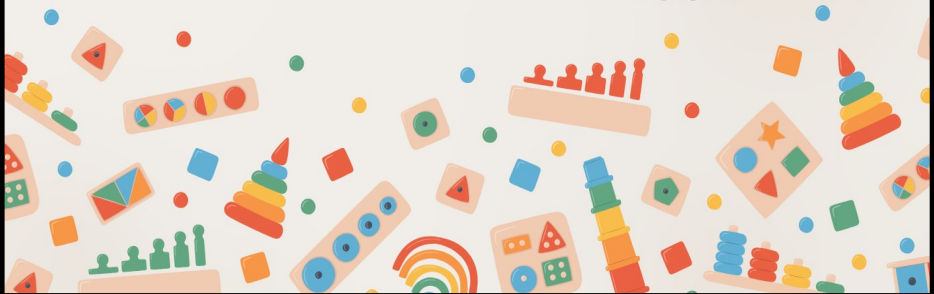

OATES NOTES FROM CULKERTON

GARDENING TIPS FOR MARCH

How is your garden looking after a winter of storms, gloomy greyness and ever-present damp? Surprisingly green, verdant wall moss loves the Cotswolds and older trees have an extra layer of moss too.

March is a truly spring month; early flowers abound. In the third week we have the Vernal Equinox and more importantly at the end of the month summer time returns, hurray! Over 12 hours of daylight allowing early morning & evening gardening once more.

The seasonal layer of colour is predominantly tones of yellow, followed by blues and purples. Daffodils, narcissus, forshythia, followed by hyacinths and muscari.

Have a good look at your garden to assess immediate tasks. Repair or clear away any winter damage. Some evergreen foliage is ruffled with damage from Storm Darrah, time to trim and tidy up. What has been delayed by wet and cold spells, particularly pruning and shaping, there is still time to complete by the end of the month. A rule of thumb is to only remove a third of woody growth. Birds will now be nesting, especially Robins, so be sensitive not to disturb them. Most of the remaining dry, dead stems from last year's annuals are left standing until after the hibernating insects become active. Look out for ladybirds; they are the best indicators and then clear the remnants. Why do I care so much for these creatures? They are truly our garden helpers, co-habiting with us and consuming less desirable aphids, and molluscs.

I find weeding is much more successful in dry weather. The traditional March winds are a real asset drying the ground. If soil sticks to your boots, it's too wet. Cleared ground can have a good layer of mulch added, this will suppress weed germination and can be added to wet ground. The winter wet weather also washes away nutrients on lighter soils, so gently fork in dry fertilisers, especially for flowering shrubs like roses.

For those of us with ponds, the appearance of frog spawn indicates seasonal warmth.

Some readers may be ahead of me sowing seeds with heated greenhouses or propagation units with lights especially for slow maturing summer crops of peppers and aubergines. This does give earlier harvests. Last May I visited a heated greenhouse included in NGS Open Garden with full grown tomato plants with set fruit; and it was only the first week of the month! These were sown in March to

crop in June. Creating a controlled growing environment is certainly a way forward with our topsy turvy climate change weather.

There are hardy vegetable seeds to sow under glass without extra heating in modules or seed trays to plant out next month. Some benefit from multi sown modules, four or five beetroot, leeks, spring onions, peas; others are better in trays to be planted out individually; lettuce, spinach, cabbage and kales. If the ground is workable, sow parsnips, plant potatoes and onion sets.

For the very impatient gardeners, try sprouting seeds, micro veg, and peas for shoots; delicious for quickly grown early salads easily grown on windowsills.

WINTER PASSING

If there was anything to remember this winter by, it would be anticyclonic gloom, the weather forecaster's term for the uniform leaden pall that reigned over us for two whole weeks at Christmas. There was another bout of it in mid-January – superbly timed for Blue Monday. Then, it returned with vengeance for the week leading up to Valentine's Day. Oh, and the first ten days of November, when winter was brewing, were filled with – you've guessed it – anticyclonic gloom.

And when our skies weren't dulled with stygian gloom, it was raining; at least anticyclonic gloom offers little precipitation. Suffice it that we have not been blessed with much 'crisp winter sunshine', to use the weather forecaster's term, and SAD (Seasonal Affective Disorder) levels have been high.

One of the problems with anticyclonic gloom is that the land doesn't dry out under it, so even a couple of hours of drizzle makes everything soggy again. Seldom before have the drying winds of late winter been so needed, to dry out the land, make the old year's beech leaves scurry and send the rooks sky-dancing.

No, at the end of this winter we will remember absolutely nothing about it. We didn't get the toboggan out, again. Good riddance.

All the while, though, new signs of spring were appearing. At first, plants were romping ahead, with hazel catkins and primroses well out on New Year's Day; but January kept within its traditional temperature range – just – and slowed things down. We had frosts on 20 January nights, nearly all of them marginal, and cold nights and days during early February, which even silenced the robins which had been trilling

beautifully all January.

But a slow, drawn-out progression into spring is perhaps best, as it means we better can savour each new sign of spring. Why not keep a diary, recording the likes of the first great tit calling, the first song thrush getting over-excited and loud, the first mistle thrush casting stentorian notes across the park, the lark ascending at Candlemas and best of all the first blackbird in song (Tetbury Tesco, Feb 1st, above the airline – he's superb); and all the new plants appearing – snowdrop, crocus, aconites and so on, in leaf and then in flower, bluebell leaves in the woods, and so on; and insects such as the first honey bee, bumblebee, hoverfly and butterfly. You can also record the last fieldfares and redwings, both of which have been relatively poor in our district this winter.

After such a dismal winter, we deserve a best-ever spring. Breaking News: Rooks building, Feb 12th.
