

St Kyneburga. I wonder if you know anything about this saint. I wonder if you can pronounce the name, let alone spell it. Living in the Diocese of Gloucester we should know about her. She lived in the eighth century and was a co-foundress and abbess of the first religious community which existed where our cathedral is now.

GARDENING TIPS FOR JUNE

The essential state of being is to enjoy our summer whatever it may bring weatherwise; so far this seems to be the year of exceeding previous weather records. The extraordinary dry and hot weather in May took us into June, garden wise a month early. Roots really matter in these conditions; bulbous and deep-rooted established flora revelled in the extra sunlight.

Augment your garden enjoyment options. A few tweaks in plant choices can make such a difference. For sunny days sit or dine in amongst the flowers in sun and semi shade, encircle a favourite place with lots of seasonal colour, tall, short, in pots or other containers. For really hot weather, a shade garden under a mature tree is a delight, with mown lawn and tall ferns. Leaves in a multitude of green colours and different shapes adds to the cooling effect. For rainy days looking from comfy chairs through windows, check your views, each window can have a different colour theme. I love my greenhouse for cool or wet days, a bistro set, table and two chairs inside doubles as potting table. Large pots grow Pineapple Guava, Loquat, shrubby Salvia, and Cobaea scandens alba. Mexican Daisy, Erigeron karvinskianus informally self-seeds in the paved floor.

Bountiful harvests this month, rewards for earlier sowings, broad beans, lettuce, radish, beetroot, carrots, summer spinach, and peas.

'Sowing in dust grow they must' continued to surprise during May, although given a helpful water when sowing, it was miraculous when broad rows of carrot seedlings appeared. Low tunnels of fine mesh do help to retain some moisture, thankfully received by seedlings and almost imperceptible to humans. During intense heat and sunlight light shade from the mesh is also beneficial for both germinating seedlings and transplanted young plants. Some plants revel in heat; sweetcorn, melons and zinnias. Large sections of tomato plants inadvertently broken or as cuttings can be easily rooted in water and replanted.

Cooler and moister soil broadens the list of seeds to sow; salad crops, lettuce, salad leaf mixes, cucumbers, radish, spring onions, chicory, endive, autumn broad beans, French beans, beetroot, carrots, Florence fennel, kale, broccoli, turnips and Swiss chard. Flowers to sow now; hellebores, sweet William, and wallflowers for next year.

Summer pruning of fruit trees focuses on shaping, limiting growth and for apples shortening leaders on spur fruiting types. Now is the time to prune all the stone fruit trees, plums, greengages, peach and apricots, avoiding fruit of course. After summer flowering shrubs have finished

in bloom, remove about one third of the old wood to encourage new shoots for next years flowers, and give trees and shrubs a liquid feed of 'Tomorite' or home-made nettle and comfrey fertilizer, diluted 1:10.

Weeding is an important task now, remember 'one year's weeding saves seven years seeding'. Learn to recognise weed seedlings from an early stage when they are much easier to remove. Mulches prevent weeds germinating and keeping soil moist.

SPRING OF 2025, EULOGY AND REALITY

We seem to be heading for our sunniest spring ever. That should be a cause for great celebration, but our farmers and growers desperately need rain and much of our wildlife does too, not to mention the gardens. Potatoes may be rather small and expensive this year – and imported fruit too.

For the record, we had 444mm (17.5"! - ed) of rain during a preposterously wet autumn and 286mm (11"! - ed) during the soggy winter months. That means that groundwater and reservoir levels are reasonably high. Then the great plumber in the sky switched the tap off, on 27 February to be precise. Since then, 6mm of rain fell during March, and 21mm during April (including 15mm on the night of the 22nd). None fell between the early hours of St George's Day and the evening of 11 May, when we had the lightest of showers (3mm). Then another big and bold anticyclone developed.

This has been the most wonderful spring for blossom. First, the deepest Blackthorn 'snow'. Male sallows ('Pussy Willow') flamed golden, then in early May the female trees cast myriad seeds to drift on the breeze (this coincided with dandelion seeding time). Fruit trees were adorned with blossom, especially the apples – though rain is needed to swell the fruit, and to prevent the trees from dropping the crop. Magnolias, for once, flowered long and well, unblemished by frost. The Horse Chestnuts have been magnificent, bearing candelabras of white or red blossom; and Hawthorn time arrived early - in early May.

Your resident entomologist would like to be able to report that all this blossom was well tendered by pollinating insects, buzzing with a contentment of bees and hoverflies; but numbers of most pollinating insects have been relatively low, due to the knock-on impact of last year's insect *annus horribilis*. Much has depended on the presence and absence of hive bees. Spring insects have, though, lived

unusually long, having not been blasted away by pulses of foul and abusive weather. Orange Tip and Brimstone butterflies have wandered far and wide.

This is likely to be the Summer of the Cabbage White. Net those cabbages! Numbers of Large and Small Whites were unusually high during late April and early May. Last summer clobbered the parasitic wasps that regulate their numbers. In rural districts, they breed mainly on Brassica (cabbage family) crops sown along field margins as wild bird and/or pheasant feed strips. They can also cross The Channel as migrants and may be massing in France.


