Dear Friends,

I have been thinking a lot about prayer recently and it got me thinking about how many of us pray on a regular basis – other than when we go to church or as a reflex reaction like "Thank God!".

Do we know *how* to pray - has anyone ever sat down with us and said 'This is how to pray?

We tend to think of prayer as being an individual, private activity and one that should come naturally, but does it?

For some of us, prayer is a safety net - we're glad it's there, but we hope we never have to use it.

Prayer is about our relationship with God and like any relationship, it requires time.

I suspect many of us, like me, tend to pray on the run – sending up prayers of thanks or asking for help or intercession when the need arises, but our relationship with God cannot flourish unless we find time to be fully present to Him: speaking with and listening to him, sharing silence or beauty, delight or sorrow.

There are times when we want to spend time in quiet prayer but other times when we want to shout at God or cry. The most important thing is to share it with our heavenly father, who loves us and wants us to share our thoughts with him. In the words of the hymn 'Take it to the Lord in prayer'.

I have recently completed an online course exploring how mixed media can be an act of creative worship and how it can open up ways of having a conversation (praying) with God. I have found that taking time to create something prayerfully has deepened my relationship with God. As I put together my 'picture', I am praying constantly and thoughtfully, rather than my usual rushed prayers. And then of course, I am taking time to listen to God too as prayer is a two-way process.

And as I pray, I am beginning to come to a greater understanding of

God's purpose for me and my life.

- a daily WhatsApp prayer group where we pray for the Benefice and the world (message me on 07774 104990 if you would like to join the group)

- The prayer labyrinth at St Luke's, Frampton Mansell provides a wonderful opportunity for private prayer surrounded by God's creation

To nurture faith; to inspire success

NEWS FROM SAPPERTON WILDER

The venture into regenerative agriculture in 153 ha/380 acres of former cereal fields to the south and east of Sapperton continues apace. It is bringing significant wildlife benefits. The overall objective is to build a sustainable, nature-friendly farming system on low grade agricultural land, producing quality food by using principles aligned to the government's Sustainable Farming Incentive.

Seven fields were sown with herbal leys, some last September, some this spring. These mixes contain a variety of grasses, herbs and legumes designed to improve soil health and build natural fertility – and so wean us off artificial fertilisers. This summer, they've been pink with clover; next summer, they will glow purple, when the lucerne comes through – and will buzz with bees. The intention is to plough these leys up in a few years' time, to grow a quality crop of heritage wheat, for bread – fingers crossed.

One field has been planted up with young trees, under an agroforestry venture – another new-age innovation. The trees have been deer-fenced, of necessity. There are hopes to bulldoze a number of E-shaped mounds, to help study how butterflies and other invertebrates adapt locally to climate change. Three RAU student projects are underway, and the fields are being used for a PhD case study by a Countryside & Community Research Institute researcher.

Surveys by specialist naturalists have found that a remarkable number of rare species have moved in, indicating how special our landscape area is. In particular, the fields have developed an impressive array of rare and even endangered plants known as 'arable weeds'; largely diminutive plants which grew commonly in old-fashioned cornfields but became the largely unscheduled victims of the 20th century agricultural revolution. The best is perhaps the delightful Shepherd's Needle. These plants are hard to conserve, but may flare up episodically, after ploughing, under no-sprays management. More predictably, Bee

Orchids have appeared in some of the headlands.

Some rare farmland birds are returning and breeding. Butterflies have moved in impressively: the herbal leys this summer developed sizeable colonies of the Common Blue, which is by no means common anymore. This butterfly may abound here next year, should we get a decent summer. Marbled Whites are already breeding in most of the fields. Two rare moths have been found: the Marbled Brown, which is only really known in Gloucestershire from the Forest of Dean, and a scarce long-horn micromoth *Nemophora metallica*, which breeds on scabiouses. Various rare beetles and flies have been found, notably the Rugged Oil Beetle (a nocturnal beast) and the Downland Robberfly.

NOTES FROM CULKERTON

GARDENING TIPS FOR OCTOBER

So much of gardening is in two time zones, the here and now and planning ahead for the next season. Yesterday I had a phone call asking if I would like to arrange flowers for the church harvest festival in a month's time; possibly all the flowers and fruit looking wonderful now in mid-September will be over by the festival weekend in mid-October. There was no need to fret after scanning the plot; I have a host of papery silver seeded stems of Honesty, plenty of colourful foliage, and ripening berries in yellow and crimson. There will be flowers too, probably the last few of late summer.

Thinking through the here and now, as autumn and winter progress, there are dry weather and wet weather tasks. During dry weather, continue to weed the plots, concentrating especially where perennial weeds are a problem, particularly couch grass, sometimes called switch grass; Elymus repens is the scientific name. This weed gives gardeners undue worry, it is invasive with vigorous running roots and will regrow from broken roots, however the roots are shallow and forking out these roots will clear the ground. Perennial herbaceous clumps can become infested. Autumn is just the time to lift these clumps, dividing, removing the grass roots at the same time and replanting. The very best way to separate the grass from the cherished perennial clump is to lift and wash the soil away leaving all the roots exposed for inspection, the long white grass roots are easy to spot and pull out. If lawns and grass paths are known to contain couch grass allow a no-go zone along the plot edge keeping this weed free.

This is an excellent time to lift and divide perennials, water as replanting the smaller clumps. Add home-made compost as a 'top dressing' mulch.

Continue to plant spring flowering bulbs, remember to plant narcissus deeply, at least 20 cm, to encourage blooms for many years. It is much better to wait until the soil has cooled down before planting tulips, again deeply for successive annual blooms. Tulips also make beautiful spring displays in containers.

If the grass continues to grow an end of year mowing could be in this month. Of course, add the mowings to the compost heap for use next spring.

During wet weather spend time in the shed or greenhouse, giving a good tidy up and making any necessary repairs. Check metal



greenhouses for loose structural bolts ahead of strong wind and clean the glass for better light during winter.

Start to think through what new crops and flowering plants, shrubs or trees and where to plant them. Now is the time to fine-tune or reorganise gardens. Some plants might be in the wrong place visually or need a better place to thrive.

Take cuttings of ripe wood to root overwinter in open garden soil; fruit bushes, roses, lavender and flowering shrubs are all good choices. Cut straight stems 20 to 30cms long, push half the length into the soil and label the stems. Be patient until new shoots appear next spring.
