

Dear Friends,

We are very excited to announce changes to **COATES CINEMA** which are happening for the start of our new season recommencing in September.

Our first year has established Coates Cinema movie nights firmly on the social calendar under the Rural Cinema scheme.

The committee has decided to take the next step forward to expand our choices of films with the purchase of a special movie license. This will offer to you a much wider selection of film choices from Netflix, Disney, SKY, Paramount, Prime in addition to live steaming including the latest film releases as well as classical older films.

To bring this about we plan to make COATES CINEMA CLUB a membership organisation from September 2024. Membership will be £40 per annum (2024 - 2025) showing at least 10 films during that time. 



Section 3.6 Men-only Recipe Victoria Sandwich

225g (8oz) softened butter

225g (8oz) caster sugar

4 large eggs

225g (8oz) self-raising

flour

2 level teaspoons baking powder

For the filling and Topping: 4 tablespoons jam of your choice for sprinkling

a little castor sugar

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C/Fan 160°C /Gas 4. Grease 2 20cm (8in) sandwich tins and line the base of each tin with baking parchment.
- 2. Measure butter, sugar, eggs, flour & baking powder into a large bowl & beat until thoroughly blended. Divide the mixture evenly between the tins & level out.
- 3. Bake in pre-heated oven for about 25 minutes or until well risen. Leave to cool in the tins for a few minutes, then turn out, peel off the parchment and finish cooling on a wire rack.
- 4. When completely cold, sandwich the cakes together with the jam. Sprinkle with castor sugar to serve.

GARDENING TIPS FOR JUNE

Summer is here, so the most important gardening tip is to enjoy being outside with beautiful flowers, gathering harvests, or having friends and family around for social gatherings.

This summer I have the most beautiful display of Canterbury Bells (Campanula medium), tall, multi branched and long lasting cut flowers. These are biennials and are usually available as mixed colours, white, pink, and purple shades. If seed is set, it will be ready to sow this autumn for next year's flowers.

Wildflowers included with cultivated are the wonderfully airy cow parsley, as soon as these set seed I start thinning the plants out keeping some to show off the green seed heads, more are removed or cut to the base as the seeds mature leaving only a handful of plants to self-seed in selected areas to follow on from spring flowering bulbs. Another dainty wildflower allowed to mingle is pink campion and is treated much the same way as the cow parsley with a few plants left to self-seed. Alternatively ripe seed can be harvested and sown where desired.

During the summer I start taking stock of how the garden is looking and if there are any design updates or tweaks, fine tune to plan for the autumn planting. Some herbaceous perennials are short lived and they are missed when they disappear, so order these for autumn. Probably no bulbs to order this year; there are plenty and deeply planted make many happy returns.

After so much rain, almost continuous from last summer until March this year, one plant family in particular responded with vigour, the roses. Although I have heard some professional garden designers say they will no longer be using roses, as amateur growers we can give a little more attention and TLC. Roses do not like the dryness climate change has brought over many previous years; their improved care is in the soil. Look after the soil with lavish top dressings of good organic matter to improve soil quality, moisture retention and increased soil micro-organisms, including our good friends the earth worms.

Keep up with spot watering when needed and weeding. Do not let undesirable weeds flower and set seeds, especially the tall grasses this year, chop the tops off if you are time short and dig out the roots in your next gardening session.

Growing tomatoes outside has been difficult. At the time of writing cold nights are the problem, and the Blight Resistant Tomato Trial is indeed

a trial. Warmer weather will turn this around dramatically, which may happen during July and August, fingers crossed.

During the next two months sow vegetable seeds for the autumn, radicchio, beetroot, carrots, fast maturing peas, cabbages, kales, cauliflower, chard, coriander, spinach, Florence Fennel, salad rocket, dill, land cress, lettuce, and spring onions.

Clear spent plants and compost these mixed with grass mowings. Sow green manures in any vacant spot or plot to keep the ground covered. Dead head and feed repeat flowering roses to encourage further flushes of blooms.

METEOROLOGICAL BLUES

There are lies, damn lies and statistics. Then there are party manifestos. Then there is the Met Office's assessment of our inglorious spring of 2024. It was, according to Met Office analysis, the UK's warmest spring on record. More incredible, the assessment informs us that May was the UK's warmest on record, in a data set going back to 1884.

Our recollection here, untainted by manifestos or statistics, is of a decidedly indifferent May (albeit with a pleasant second week), a wet then cold April, a despicably wet March: overall, a horribly wet spring. The Met Office states that the mean temperature for the entire UK in May was 13·1C. The problem here is that large chunks of the country felt like that, by day, when it should be have warmer - but also by night, when it should have been cooler. Night and day temperatures are starting to merge...

The Met Offices' assessment for the three-month period was skewed by two things. First, the fact that Scotland, and The Highlands especially, enjoyed a particularly warm spring – that's where the good weather was. Secondly, blankets of dense cloud ensured that, overall, nights were unusually mild UK-wide. So, this spring wasn't, for once, characterised by days of stratocumulus cloud that dissolved away into cool, clear nights – that pattern developed instead in early June, at the start of summer.

Tucked away within all this statistical analysis is the Met Office's admission that the UK experienced (or rather, suffered) its sixth

wettest spring on record. Now, that's more like it! My garden rain gauge recorded 82mm of precipitation during May, following on from 100mm in April and a flood-inducing 124mm in March: that makes a meteorological spring total of 306mm. Also, the Met Office admits that the spring was unusually dull. It was!

The net result is that the grass, and other thuggish vegetation like brambles and nettles, grew like mad, 'No Mow May' turned into 'Mow All May' (or at least until the mower broke down), and insects were notable for their absence. Early June saw the deepest trough in winged insect numbers I've ever noted – not just the butterflies, but just about everything else. Visits to the Stroud Commons, where favoured insect plants like Horseshoe Vetch were flowering profusely, recorded a dearth of winged insects other than a paltry few hive bees – pollinators, as they are now called.

Ask yourself how many times you had to clean your windscreen of squashed flies, then ask what on earth our swallows and martins were feeding on, poor things? Then ask yourself whether you've got any sunscreen, and where it might be?

Seldom before has Summer needed to redeem a year more. Next time: Heatwave Blues.


COBALT HEALTH
