

For the filling and Topping: 4 tablespoons jam of your choice for sprinkling

a little castor sugar

1. Preheat the oven to 180°C/Fan 160°C /Gas 4. Grease 2 20cm (8in) sandwich tins and line the base of each tin with baking parchment. 2. Measure butter, sugar, eggs, flour & baking powder into a large

bowl & beat until thoroughly blended. Divide the mixture evenly between the tins & level out.

3. Bake in pre-heated oven for about 25 minutes or until well risen. Leave to cool in the tins for a few minutes, then turn out, peel off the parchment and finish cooling on a wire rack.

4. When completely cold, sandwich the cakes together with the jam. Sprinkle with castor sugar to serve.

With better weather over the last month the children have made the most of our super grounds. The vegetable patch is flourishing thanks to the tender care from the gardening club, run by Mrs Hendry.

In early June, Oak class took a trip to Cirencester to meet a local geographer who took us on a tour



of Corinium. The children looked at the position of the town and why the Romans settled there. We looked for evidence of the Romans and, following a workshop at the Corinium museum, we ended at the Amphitheatre were we learnt about more than just gladiators.

Year 5 and 6 took off to Dartmoor at the end of June for the biannual Rodmarton Residential. The children took part in rock climbing, river scrambles and ladder climbing. The activities built confidence and skill within the children – perhaps most challenging of all was being away from home and packing their own sleeping bag!

Acorn class made their way to Oxford to visit the Natural History Museum. The children enjoyed seeing all the amazing artefacts on offer at the Museum.

Following the District Sports event in May, we had several children qualify for the Area Sport events. This competition draws all 1st and 2nd place competitors from Cotswold schools together in a grand finale. Rodmarton had qualifiers for sprinting, throwing, long jump, triple jump and speed bounce. This is a huge achievement for our little school and we congratulate all competitors whether they become area champions or not (and a few from Rodmarton did!).

Our annual sports day was held in early July – all children took part in fun activities to begin with, accruing points for their school house teams. Children were then invited to take part in sprint races, followed by a fun parents' race and what has become the iconic Year 6 vs the teachers tug-o-war.

The school community were treated to the Oak class end of year production of Bugsy Malone in the penultimate weeks of the summer term. The children put on a fabulous show – singing, dancing and splurging!

The term has gone by incredibly fast and much has happened. Among those needing mention are Health and Wellbeing Activity day at Cotswold farm park, the Y6 secondary transition days, our final Rocksteady concert, a visit from the local library, Year 3/4 cricket, Forest school and several new faces starting at our school!

GARDENING TIPS FOR SEPTEMBER

Later this month 22 September marks the Autumn Equinox and this makes a fine time to review 2024 gardening successes and what didn't do well. Also looking forward to the next season and 2025.

This year has been, without a doubt, challenging for all gardeners, amateur and professional alike. Sadly, it may well have put new beginners completely off trying another season; experienced gardeners know something will do well. Results seems to highlight location. A good example of this is my son in Bristol with a small, city garden which is a heat trap, he has harvested abundant outdoor tomatoes starting in early July, whereas my plants from the same batch of seedlings were five weeks later, due to much cooler temperatures, especially at night during June and into July. Peas, onions, gladioli and roses are winners for me.

Tomatoes and other tender crops grew strongly in glasshouses and poly tunnels, cropping early and heavily. Surprisingly, those I saw growing, showed signs of heat stress with curled leaves and were much less affected by cold night temperatures.

Slugs & snails have multiplied since the hot summer weather of 2022 which crashed the numbers; insects on the other hand have been very noticeable by their absence, only picking up with warm weather in mid-August. This shows in local top fruit crops of greengages, and plums, with a poor set and much less fruit.

After a slow start to the growing season when plants stayed small, lately there has been a surge, trees have grown metres taller, and weeds are abundant!

Lightly prune trees and shrubs now to keep a good shape or curtail overhanging a neighbour's boundary, leave a thorough prune until winter when these are dormant.

Clear weeds as soon as possible to prevent extra weed seeds falling to the soil. Sow a green manure over cleared ground, hoe this as a cut and drop cover when the plants are 15cm tall which will also include newly germinated weed seeds. Two tasks in one, weeds cleared a second time and the soil is covered for regeneration.

Give a liquid feed to all trees, shrubs and perennials forming flower buds at this month. Agapanthuses are a good example, especially if these are grown in containers. Check pots/containers planted with tulips which have been left undisturbed for a good summer dormancy for weed seedlings and remove.

NOTES FROM CULKERTON (cont)

Bulb buying season is upon us, remember to plant daffodils and tulips deeply for reflowering over many years. Miniature flowering bulbs of iris and tulips seem to do better in terracotta pots, these are more visible in early spring and can be given pride of place, later pots moved for summer dormancy in a less conspicuous, sunny place.

Prepare the ground and greenhouses for autumn planting. Parsley, coriander, rocket, spinach, salad leaves, radish and turnips can be sown now. Sweet peas and other hardy annuals, cornflowers, nigella and canterbury bells are best sown now.

Give the garden a general tidy up and put teak oil on wooden furniture. Leave some architectural tall stems standing to look beautiful during winter, teasels are my favourite and attract goldfinches.

Most of us have noticed the lack of insects this summer, even if only through the absence of splattings on our windscreens. Insect populations are renowned for their boom-and-bust dynamics, with weather being a significant driver, but this year's bust is way out of kilter with the weather – we have had less insect depletion from far wetter summers. It cannot just be down to the vagaries of the spring and summer weather. Perhaps the mild, wet winter did untold damage – in which case, we have Big Problems. A cocktail of problems is most likely.

To us, insects fit into Nasty and Nice. Biting and stinging insects have been perhaps welcomely absent: how many of you have been troubled by a mosquito this summer, and how many horsefly bites have you had? My own tallies are nil and six (squashed) respectively. Our common wasps (two similar species) are decidedly rare, though their numbers should increase during September. Ecologically, though, these 'nasties' do far more good than harm, they just annoy us, me included.

Most butterfly species have had a shocker, including our local Large Blue colonies, and their nocturnal moth cousins too. But these are just the icing on the pollinator cake. The bees (bumble, solitary and honey) have been even poorer, and the hoverflies and other beneficial flies too.

It has been a very poor summer for migratory insects: several million

hoverflies have failed to arrive – and their larvae feed on aphids. The migratory dragonflies have failed too, and the migrant moths faltered after showing some early promise.

Of course, many species are just late, held back by indifferent weather – but the later the fewer.

Yet amongst the plethora of losers, there are winners; none more so than a small golden-haired fly called the Downland Beefly or *Villa cingulata* (Google it, you'll like it). This small but pretty and distinctive fly was considered extinct in the UK for some sixty years, until I turned it up on Daneway Banks in June 2000 – the following day a much better entomologist discovered it near Bath. Party time. It then stormed the Cotswold grasslands and decided to conquer much of southern England. It has now spread off the limestones onto other grasslands and has invaded Wales. Its ecology is unclear: it may be a parasitoid of mining bees, but no one has studied it, and its success may result from it suddenly changing tack and moving onto something else, parasitizing moth larvae perhaps. Insects move goalposts, they have to.

The importance of good news stories cannot be underplayed.
